### Welcome to the monthly newsletter.

An issue that has been confounding the Association lately has been identifying the most appropriate way to make long term changes to development and town planning practices.

Current practices appear to favour clear felling an entire development area against selective removal of vegetation.

This leaves the area with a sudden shortage of habitat trees for a variety of native wildlife that may utilise this vegetation for food or shelter. Replanting of trees is to be encouraged however it takes approximately 5 years of growth before a eucalypt will provide suitable food for a koala and a great deal longer for hollows to develop that could provide nesting opportunities for possums, gliders or birds.

Five years may not seem a long time for these trees to establish but let's put it into perspective.

A koala in the wild has a life expectancy of 13-18 years.

The average life expectancy of a possum in the wild is 6-7 years.

Gliders have an average life expectancy of 12-15 years.

Sean FitzGibbon, from University of Queensland, presented a very interesting session at Osprey House Environment Centre on September 6. More details and some interesting opportunities will be discussed at our next Association meeting.
